GENERAL MANAGER'S CORNER

I've heard it said that Southern California does indeed have four seasons; Heat, Wildfires, Mudslides and Earthquakes. Happy Autumn everyone! The nights are getting longer and cooler, which is a pleasant change as we transition from the 'Heat' season to the 'Wildfire' season.

While it is true all year, during the Heat Season, otherwise known as Summer, the Company does not import any water. Not one drop. All of SAWCo's water originates from San Antonio Canyon and Cucamonga Canyon. Helped by cool weather and ample rainfall during the first half of 2023, the canyons continue to meet our water needs this year. In January of 2023 shareholders consumed 817 Acre-Feet of water. In comparison, July consumption almost doubled to 1,577 acre-feet.

Shareholders have consumed 6,476 acre-feet of water through the first seven months of 2023. At the same time, the Company has been able to stash away 5,937 acre-feet of water into underground storage thanks to high streamflow from our canyons. Both of these statistics are good news. Consumption is on track to meet full entitlement delivery by the end of the year. At the same time, the Company has been able to store significant water in local groundwater basins for future use. These two points of data are wonderful news for both the short-term and long-term health of the San Antonio Water Company.

As San Bernardino moves into cooler weather the Company will be adjusting monthly entitlements downward to reflect reduced irrigation and landscaping demands. Please make sure to adjust your sprinklers for cooler weather. Or better yet, install a smart irrigation controller that will do it automatically for you.

Wildfires and Santa Ana winds are a way of life during Autumn in Southern California. Their devastating impact is brought home every year through TV, newspaper articles and social media accounts. Protecting your home from wildfires requires diligence and forethought.

For its part, the Company takes wildfire threats seriously and conducts a number of preparatory efforts. One such effort is ensuring all the system valves that control water flow are functioning. Referred to as 'valve exercising', company staff routinely open and close the hundreds of buried valves strategically located throughout our system. This 'exercising' ensures valves will operate in times of emergency, such as being able to stop the flow of water when a fire hydrant is damaged. Additionally, properly working valves allow the Company to strategically redirect water during times of emergency to areas that need it most. Valve exercising is just one way the Company maintains your water system.

Please prepare and stay safe during fire season!

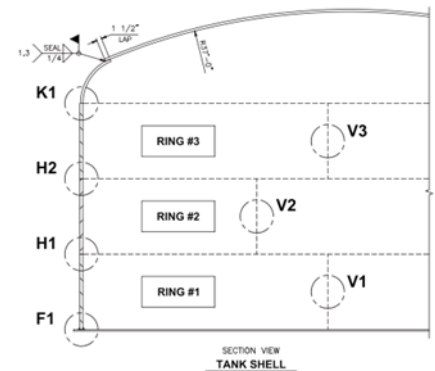


What's Happening?

Project Update

HOLLY DRIVE RESERVOIR – PHASE 3

At its December 2022 meeting, the Board approved a \$920k project to install a second 100,000-gallon steel tank at the upper end of Holly Drive. This tank will provide additional fire and operations water storage for the Company. The second tank has been constructed and is currently receiving its protective epoxy coating. This final phase brings total water storage at our Holly Drive site to 200,000 gallons.



FOREBAY OUTFALL MODERNIZATION

At its May 2023 meeting, the Board approved a \$124k contract to design a replacement pipeline for the irrigation outfall from the Company's Forebay facility. This project will relocate an existing antiquated pipeline from Ocean View Drive backyards into Mesa Terrace Drive and remove an old hydraulic break at Paloma Curve. The project is currently under design and construction of this \$1M project is scheduled to begin in the Winter of 2024.

WELL 31 PIPELINE REPLACEMENT

At its May 2023 Meeting, the Board approved a \$87k design contract to replace approximately 1,400 lineal feet of pipeline delivering water from Well 31 to the Company's facilities along Upland Hills Golf Club. The project is currently under design and construction of this \$500k project should begin in the Winter of 2023.

WELL 19 CONSTRUCTION

At its April 2022 meeting, the Board approved a \$1.2M project to install a new well at the Well 19 site in the Cucamonga Canyon adjacent to the Holiday Rock Company. The test well has been completed and water is currently being sampled from various locations to determine the best depth to pump water from. At its September 2023 meeting, the Board authorized the construction of a \$1.6M production well at Well Site 19. Construction of this new production well will begin immediately. To bring the well water into our system we will need to construct a new pipeline in 2024 or 2025.
